MESSAGE FROM FR. RICHARD

In an interview published this week Pope Francis speaks about receiving God's mercy in confession and the honesty that demands, "In order to be filled with his gift of infinite mercy, we need to recognize our need, our emptiness, our wretchedness. We cannot be arrogant." Mercy is the experience of God's sacrificial love encountering my self-centered pride. My only hope is the outpouring of God's mercy that heals me from the inside out, at the very core of my being, in the depths of my heart.

In the ninth chapter of the Book of Genesis, God wants to do away with sinful humanity but in mercy he saves Noah and his family to begin again. God then places in the sky the rainbow as the sign of his loving patience with humanity. We so often see rainbows here in our islands. Rainbows appear when sunlight is refracted by rain. God's merciful love shines when it encounters the rain and gloom of my misery. Why do I arrogantly deny my need for God's merciful love? Why not give it to Him who can transform my darkness into His light?

*Rite of
Christian
Initiation
for Adults*



The formation of adults and process by which they are initiated into the Church is known as the "Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults" or "RCIA". The RCIA is for persons of reason (7 years and older) who follow a process to help them grow in awareness to God's call to conversion, or for persons catechized and un-

catechized persons from another Christian faith seeking full communion with the Roman Catholic Church, or for persons who were baptized as infants in the Catholic Church yet not given any religious upbringing with the Catholic Tradition. Catechesis is based in scripture and proclaimed in the midst of the worshipping community. Anyone who would like to learn more for themselves, refer a family member, friend or neighbor, or to become a Sponsor - you are invited to attend an opening/introductory session on Sunday, Feb 07 at 10:30 AM-11:30 AM in the parish library. SHELTER THE HOMELESS.

There are many circumstances that could lead to someone becoming a person without a home. Christ encourages us to go out and meet those without homes, affirming their worth and helping them seek a resolution to the challenges they face.

- See if your parish or diocese is involved with a local homeless shelter and volunteer some time.
- Donate time or money to organizations that build homes for those who need shelter.
- Many homeless shelters need warm blankets for their beds. If you can knit or sew that would be an extra loving gift.
- There are millions of children and families who are on the move, fleeing from war, illness, hunger and impossible living conditions, and searching for peace and safety. Engage parish groups of children, youth, young adults, and families in doing some research on the causes and challenges that these families face to survive. Contact Catholic Social Services, or diocesan offices of peace and justice for help with your research. Seek ways to provide shelter for the homeless locally, regionally, nationally or internationally.
